

CHAIR'S REPORT

2024 was another very good year for the Canterbury Hockey Association (CHA), as evidenced by the progress made in governance and delivery.

Following a lengthy and wide consultation with the community, the 5 year Strategic Plan for CHA was finalised and implemented. The values and strategic pillars adopted reflect the sentiment of the hockey community and we thank all those who contributed. Central to the plan is focus on the community and with a more connected network and improved collaboration, we are in a strong position to capitalise on the progress made in recent years.

A key pillar in the strategic plan is accessibility and inclusivity. CHA has continued to provide hockey opportunities to physically disabled people, wider culture and gender groups, and Tū Manawa Active Aotearoa. We are pleased to advise CHA has now partnered with Pride Pledge, and has contributed to the Sport Integrity Commission to shape the recently launched Integrity Code. We acknowledge the cost of playing hockey remains a barrier for some participants and where possible we make every effort to minimise the impact of this. CHA is progressing the set up of a Trust fund for the purpose of assisting tamariki and rangatahi who may not otherwise be able to participate. Canterbury Hockey continues to embrace the Sport New Zealand initiative of Balance is Better philosophy which supports quality sport experiences for all young people, regardless of ability, needs and motivations.

The introduction of the new Incorporated Societies Act necessitated a review and refresh of the CHA constitution, to ensure the governance and management is compliant with the requirements of the new Act. The Act has put additional demands on resources for all of us involved in administration from club level through to national level. It has been very pleasing to see the hockey community is largely in good shape to re-register under the new Act by 5 April 2026. Club health remains a critical component of a healthy hockey community and CHA thanks all clubs for doing their bit to comply.

Following Hockey New Zealand's direction to revert back to a decentralisation model for elite athletes, CHA again played an important role as the hub for the northern part of the South Island. We have formed a good working relationship with our neighbouring associations with a vision of strengthening all associations in our area. Those associations are Mid and South Canterbury, West Coast, Buller, Marlborough and Nelson. The revamped Premier Hockey League kicked off in late 2024. The local or South Island franchise, known



as the Alpiners, performed to a high standard. While not directly managed or administered under the CHA umbrella, CHA did provide significant support to the franchise and the League generally. With wider benefits to the profile and quality of hockey driving that support, it's fair to say that in its first year the League was a success and provided a good platform to develop an even better product going forward.

CHA submitted to the Christchurch City Council's (CCC) Long Term Plan in early 2024 to source and develop a new turf in the eastern part of the city. CHA and CCC are now working together to advance this. In terms of a core administration and social facility, planning has commenced on the feasibility of either upgrading or redeveloping Nunweek Park. Our sport needs a base which can be used and enjoyed by all our members for both on field and off field events.

The financial position of CHA remains stable. Our funders and sponsors remain a vital part of the financial model and we thank them for their continued support for Canterbury Hockey. We recorded a modest surplus for the year and we continue to have a comparatively strong equity position. I would like to thank the work done by our staff finance manager Heidi O'Brien and Board Finance leader Martin Perry who have both worked diligently in managing financial matters. Thanks also to our diligent auditors Ashton Wheelans.

The CHA staff delivered quality work throughout 2024, and as a well oiled team, raised the bar across all aspects of our sport. The Board wishes to acknowledge and thank them for their dedicated work. The CHA team continues to be led by Shane Maddaford and again Shane's relentless high standards, vision, positive outlook and enthusiasm for his role and our sport remains unquestioned.

The Board would like to acknowledge the massive contribution of our volunteers. These people work across all facets of hockey and at all levels. We are so fortunate to have such a vast number of quality people who selflessly give their time for the benefit of all. Their work underpins what we achieve as a sport and without them, we wouldn't be celebrating the results we achieve.

Hockey is very grateful to have had the support from Christchurch City Council, Selwyn District Council, Waimakariri District Council. Not only by providing key playing facilities, the wider support for the delivery and promotion of hockey is appreciated.

Thanks to our Committees and advisory groups for the sound direction they provide, and the assistance they gave to the office and Board. We wish to thank the Judicial Committee led by Rachel Morrison for their demanding but important work.

The management of CHA values very highly the relationship with the North West Community Trust and St Bede's College, the North Canterbury Sports Trust and Waikirikiri Hockey at Rolleston. Equally the Board of CHA appreciates the relationship with the Harewood Hockey Club, and the use and management of the Nunweek Park complex. The Board appreciates the ongoing support from its relationship with the Canterbury Artificial Surfaces Trust (CAST).

I would like to thank my fellow Board members Simon Munt (Deputy Chair), Rachel Morrison, Penny Gough and Martin Perry and Ari Barrow who joined the us in the mid-late part of the year.

We are delighted to reflect on a very positive 2024 for Canterbury Hockey, with 2025 promising to be equally exciting as we work to realise the goals of the strategic plan and building on the progress made in 2024.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S REPORT



Once again, I am proud to report that 2024 has been another remarkable year for Canterbury Hockey, with significant milestones achieved across strategic planning, community engagement, representative performances, and competition delivery.

One of the stand-out achievements of the year was the finalisation and launch of the CHA Strategic Plan, marking a clear vision for the future of hockey in our region. The Association also proudly partnered with Pride Pledge, reinforcing our commitment to inclusion and diversity. Our community's overall excellence was also recognised at the 2024 Sport Canterbury Awards, where CHA had six finalists and celebrated the outstanding achievement of Gareth Greenfield, who was named High Performance Official of the Year for the entire Canterbury sports community.

On the representative stage, our region continued to shine. Canterbury was well represented at the National Masters tournament in Wellington. We successfully hosted the inaugural U21 Matariki Invitational Tournament, featuring 10 teams across both the Men's and Women's competitions. Canterbury teams once again competed strongly at the Men's and Women's U18 tournaments, with a significant milestone occurring with the inclusion the first-ever "C" team, which was achieved here in Christchurch at the women's event. The National Hockey Championship in Palmerston North saw all four Canterbury teams deliver a number of exceptional performances, securing a Bronze and three Gold medals.

At the participation and development level, our U13 and U15 programmes continued to expand, welcoming participants from across the South Island. The growth of these initiatives was evident with a 26% increase in participation, involving 98 teams, 31 Canterbury Coaches, and 127 Umpires and Officials. The festival-style events remain a key component in fostering the next generation of players, coaches, and officials.

Another outstanding year for our sport, community, and organisation, all made possible by the dedication, commitment and support from our amazing CHA staff.

Financial Results

Following the success of 2023, CHA entered 2024 with careful financial planning and an emphasis on strengthening key revenue streams. It is pleasing to report that another positive financial outcome was achieved.

Across our key hockey-specific revenue streams, including affiliation fees, training revenue, match fees, competition revenue, and participation & development revenue, CHA delivered a result over \$50,000 higher than the previous year. In the grant funding space, 2024 was an incredibly successful year, with 100% application success and a 4.3% increase in funding vs 2023, a testament to the strong relationships we have cultivated with our funding partners. A key driver of this success has been the unwavering support of our largest partner, New Zealand Community Trust, whose generosity continues to make a significant impact on our organisation and wider hockey community.

We are equally grateful to our other valued funding partners, whose contributions remain instrumental in sustaining and growing our sport. The commitment and support from Mainland Foundation, Lion Foundation, Pub Charity, The Trust Community Foundation, Air Rescue Services, TAB, Aotearoa Gaming Trust, Kiwi Gaming Foundation, Christchurch Casino and Four Winds Foundation are deeply appreciated. Their continued investment ensures that we can provide high-quality hockey experiences at all levels, even amidst challenging financial landscapes.

Our representative programme was delivered with financial accuracy, finishing within \$1,000 of the total budget, highlighting the sound management of this area.

The sponsorship landscape remained positive, with CHA coming within \$1,000 of our record-breaking 2023 sponsorship revenue, and maintaining strong partnerships with all key sponsors. A sincere thank you to Ashton Wheelans, Ford Baker, Happy Hire, Paladin, New World Bishopdale, Harris Farms, Signbiz, Commodore Hotel and our major sponsors – Motus Health, Polytan, Just Hockey, Connetics, and Mike Greer Homes - for their continued commitment to our hockey community. This year we also welcomed Trenzseaters to our whānau of partners.

Following a well-executed financial plan, CHA closed the 2024 financial year with a net profit of \$19,332, ensuring our organisation remains in a strong and sustainable position moving forward.

Hockey Delivery

Canterbury Hockey remains at the forefront of delivering a high-quality hockey experience across all levels of the game. The 2024 season saw 525 teams participating across Senior, Secondary School, Junior, Masters, Summer Hockey, and Indoor Hockey competitions, reinforcing the breadth and depth of engagement with our community.

On the national stage, Canterbury teams once again excelled. At the National Masters Tournament, 12 teams represented the region, achieving seven medals, including three championship titles for the Women's 50's, Men's 65's, and Men's 70's.

At the National U18 Tournament, history was made with the entry of the first-ever "C" team to a National Tournament – the Canterbury U18 Women's Development team – further demonstrating our commitment to development and inclusivity.

The National Hockey Championship was another stand-out event, with the Cats securing Bronze, while the Barracudas, Beavers (fourth consecutive title), and Cavaliers all claimed National titles with Gold medals.

The CHA-led development programmes in the U13 and U15 space continued their success, with 98 teams taking part—a 26% increase from the previous year. 31 Canterbury Coaches and 127 Umpires and Officials were involved, ensuring a high level of guidance and development for our future hockey talent.

With the growth and support of our officials remaining a priority, the CHA Officials community saw continued expansion, with 26 Junior Umpiring Badges and 10 Community Umpiring Badges awarded, along with 20 Umpires and Technical Officials achieving Level 1 accreditation. Five officials received international appointments, and an impressive 54 Canterbury-based appointments were made to National or Regional tournaments, further showcasing the strength of our Officials' pathway and community.

Community Connection

Community connection continues to be a high priority and focus of CHA. One of the strongest pillars of this connection is the relationship we share with our clubs. Our team is structured in a way that ensures clubs have access to the necessary expertise, guidance, and support across all facets of our operations. This collaboration has been instrumental in strengthening club structures, improving delivery models, and fostering a deeper sense of unity within our hockey community. The trust and mutual commitment between CHA and our clubs continues to generate positive outcomes, and we look forward to further improving

these relationships in the years to come. The ongoing engagement and collaboration within our clubs, schools, and participants have strongly contributed and enhanced the overall hockey experience for our entire community.

A key highlight of the year was CHA's partnership with the new Alpiners franchise for the launch of the 2024 Premier Hockey League. The region and Ngā Puna Wai played host to two thrilling rounds of matches, concluding with the Women's team securing Bronze and the Men's team being crowned Champions, an achievement celebrated live on TVNZ.

Our efforts to foster strong community engagement and connection will remain a priority as we continue to support and grow hockey in Canterbury.

Strengthening our Whānau

The heart of Canterbury Hockey lies in its people. It is a privilege to lead such a dedicated and passionate community, and I extend my sincere gratitude to all who contribute to our success—our staff, Board Members, players, officials, clubs, schools, volunteers and supporters.

The leadership and guidance provided by our Board and advisory groups remain an essential asset to the ongoing success of Canterbury Hockey. Under Mark's strong leadership, the Board has continued to provide invaluable expertise and governance, ensuring we remain focused on the long-term vision for our sport and community. A special thank you to Simon, Rachel, Penny, Martin, for their support and commitment to strengthening our Association, along with and Ari, who is our newest Board Member.

Additionally, our advisory groups and committees continue to play a significant role in supporting key aspects of our game, including Masters, Officials, and Juniors, as well as the crucial areas of Competitions and Judicial matters. The dedication of these volunteers to enhancing the structure and delivery of our sport is truly commendable, and we are grateful for their continued contributions to Canterbury Hockey.

The support from our key partners remains invaluable. Sport Canterbury, Christchurch City Council, Hockey New Zealand, Canterbury Artificial Surfaces Trust (CAST), and the Ngā Puna Wai Trust continue to assist in the growth and development of the sport, and we are grateful for their ongoing partnership.

With another successful year completed, our focus remains on strengthening all facets of our organisation to ensure continued success and a thriving hockey community in Canterbury.

For another consecutive year, we have experienced no staff turnover in our key hockey delivery and support roles, with only the Facilities Caretaker role changing hands. Many of our team members also achieved National and International accreditations, demonstrating their ongoing commitment to professional development.

The current CHA team is highly regarded as the best in the business, and undoubtedly the core of our organisations success. Each year, their passion and commitment to enhancing the way we deliver hockey continues to strengthen our community and ensures the best possible experience for all involved. We are incredibly fortunate to have such a talented and committed team leading the way.

A special thank you to Sam, Chris, Lucy, Joe, Heidi, Ethan, and Sunjay. Your relentless efforts and devotion to serving our hockey community does not go unnoticed. The success of Canterbury Hockey is a direct reflection of your dedication, and I am grateful for everything you do to make our sport the best it can be.

COMMUNITY PARTICIPATION DEVELOPMENT

Small Sticks in School Delivery Programme

The Small Sticks programme continued to thrive, fostering new partnerships with local community trusts to expand our reach. The primary objective remains to expose children to hockey and facilitate connections with local clubs, ensuring long-term engagement with the sport. A key feature of our delivery approach has been collaboration with other sports to host festival days at local hubs, enabling schools to participate in multi-sport experiences.

Our involvement in various large-scale initiatives further demonstrated our commitment to growth. Notably, the Selwyn Sports Spectacular provided exposure to over 2,000 children, while Primary Sport Canterbury's new Local Development Days initiative engaged nearly 500 children. In North Canterbury, Have-a-Go Days introduced close to 1,500 children to hockey, showcasing the sport's appeal across different regions. Additionally, our newest partnership with Tamai Sport, targeting lower decile schools, successfully provided over 200 children with opportunities to experience hockey, ensuring inclusivity and accessibility.

Disability & Inclusion

Ensuring hockey is accessible for all remains a top priority, with a dedicated focus on opportunities for individuals with disabilities. Our ongoing partnership with Primary Sport Canterbury saw us participate in the Disability Play Partnership, which was hosted at Nunweek Park. This initiative successfully introduced hockey to over 50 children with physical and intellectual disabilities on a weekly basis, reinforcing our commitment to inclusivity.

A significant milestone was the launch of our own programme, "Hockey Without Limits." While still in its early stages, the programme delivered five weeks of dedicated hockey sessions to a core group of five participants, who were accompanied by supportive family and friends. The programme fostered a positive environment of fun and growth, highlighting the potential for further expansion in the future.

Additionally, we proudly participated in the South Island Halberg Games for the first time, a prestigious event that allows young athletes with disabilities to explore new sports. Witnessing the enthusiasm and engagement of participants was truly inspiring, reinforcing our dedication to making hockey accessible to all.





Under 13s and Under 15s

The U13 and U15 programmes continued to build momentum, further cementing their reputation as highly popular and successful events within our development framework. Our July holiday development camps saw significant progress, with a well-structured programme designed to ensure quality learning for players, coaches, and officials alike. Key development concepts, including forward facing, finding space, and the defensive principles of block, engage, and cover, were prioritised based on local and national strategic advice and performance observations.

Participant engagement in the development camps was outstanding, with a total of 397 players taking part, underscoring the growing demand for these initiatives. The season culminated in the U13 and U15 regional festivals, which once again delivered an outstanding experience for all involved. A particular highlight was the inclusion of Marlborough teams in the Year 8 festival, adding further diversity and competition.

The U15 event was further elevated by the participation of the Southern Alpiners, featuring elite players and national representatives who engaged with participants in an evening of fun and inspiration at the tournament's social night. This opportunity allowed young athletes to interact with role models and gain invaluable insights.

Overall, the response to the U13 and U15 programmes was remarkable, with a total of 389 participants in the final events, solidifying their place as key fixtures in our development pathway.



COACH DEVELOPMENT

In the past year, we have successfully delivered 15 distinct coach development opportunities that successfully engaged a total of 205 coaches. Our programme featured a diverse range of courses from formal education with the FIH Academy to informal community-building initiatives like 'Drinks & Thinks'. This multifaceted approach has fostered both skill enhancement and a culture of collaboration among coaches.

We provided comprehensive education through the FIH Academy significantly enhancing the skills and knowledge of participating coaches. We had expert presenter Darren Cheeseman, from the FIH, who conducted the FIH Educators course in Christchurch for Hockey New Zealand, as well as supported the delivery of the Technical Skills and Foundation Goalkeeper workshops. He also contributed to the local coaching community through being the guest speaker at 'Drinks & Thinks'.

Semi-Formal Education was successfully delivered to five different CHA Clubs as well as to the Lincoln University Scholarship Students. We also worked in partnership with other organisations to deliver the Next Level Coaching Programme, which is a cross code collaboration between Canterbury Rugby, Canterbury Basketball, Canterbury Cricket, Mainland Netball, and Mainland Football. We were very fortunate to have Dr Ian Renshaw present this workshop for the Next Level Coaching Program and deliver a coaching course to our U13 and U15 Development coaches on the Constraints Led Approach.

Informal Opportunities were provided through the 'Drinks & Thinks' concept, which encouraged coaches to exchange experiences, ideas, and best practices. Notable contributions included participation from Aaron Ford, Hockey New Zealand and Chris Leslie.

Throughout all the coach development opportunities we had 205 coaches attend, with 128 Men and 77 Women.

Two new Coach Developers went through the Hockey New Zealand and Sport Canterbury Coach Developer programmes. These Developers played crucial roles in our U13 and U15 player development programmes and contributed to our U18 representative programme as well. Additionally, we assigned Developers to assist our NHC Tier Two coaches to provide ongoing learning opportunities within their respective programmes.

The coach development initiatives have made remarkable progress in enhancing the capabilities of our coaching community at various levels. With a large variety of courses reaching over 200 coaches, we have cultivated a culture of continuous learning and professional growth within hockey.



COMPETITIONS REPORT

The Canterbury Hockey Association continues to provide meaningful and competitive opportunities for players of all levels. In 2024, we supported 395 winter teams, and an additional 34 Masters teams, showcasing the widespread appeal of hockey within our region. Matches were played six days a week across 15 venues, stretching from Christchurch to Mid-Canterbury, Selwyn District, and North Canterbury. The standard of competition was exceptionally high across all grades, with notable growth in the Midweek Men's and Women's leagues. These leagues featured 51 teams competing on Monday and Tuesday nights, often into the late evening, underscoring the vibrant and inclusive nature of hockey in Canterbury. Overall, we proudly engaged close to 6,000 participants this season.

SignBiz Canterbury Premier League

In the SignBiz Canterbury Premier League Women's Competition, Marist continued their success with an outstanding season. Boasting a strong contingent of New Zealand representatives, they defended their round-robin Hinemoa Cup title with an impressive record of 12 wins and 2 draws, achieving a remarkable goal differential of +50. Marist faced their season-long rivals, HSOB/Burnside, in the championship final. After two drawn encounters during the round-robin phase, Marist delivered a clinical performance, securing a decisive 5-1 victory to become back-to-back champions.

The Men's Competition provided thrilling action week in and week out, with all eight teams demonstrating exceptional skill and determination. Harewood claimed the Porritt Cup, while HSOB/Burnside captured the Presidents Shield with a near-flawless record of 11 wins, 1 loss, and 2 draws, scoring 49 goals and conceding only 15. Despite what could be considered an upset 3-2 loss to Carlton Redcliffs in the qualifying final, HSOB/Burnside rebounded with a convincing 6-1 victory over Harewood in the midweek playoff. In a dramatic championship final, HSOB/Burnside avenged their earlier loss to Carlton Redcliffs, prevailing in an exciting shoot-out thanks to an outstanding performance by goalkeeper Louis Beckert. Their hard-fought win secured the championship trophy for the second consecutive season.

The Canterbury Hockey Association takes immense pride in the quality of our Premier League competitions. Regularly featuring tightly contested matches, these games consistently drew enthusiastic crowds, reinforcing the popularity of hockey in our community.

Secondary School Competition

The Secondary School Competition in Canterbury continues to highlight the inclusivity and attraction of hockey, drawing teams from all across the region. Each week, 24 schools are represented across Wednesday and Friday games, showcasing the passion, quality hockey, and enduring friendships formed through the sport. The Connetics Premier Boys and Girls competitions stand out as premier events, preparing athletes to excel at the national level.

Junior Hockey

The growth in our clubs' Fun Sticks programmes has been particularly encouraging, providing a fantastic introduction to the sport and fostering young talent across the region.

Matches are played across a wide network of turfs every Friday night and Saturday morning, ensuring accessibility for players throughout Canterbury. The enthusiasm and commitment of everyone involved make junior hockey a cornerstone of our hockey community.

Masters Hockey

The Canterbury Masters Competition continues to grow, with 34 teams competing in a thriving community-focused league played on Thursday nights throughout the summer. Open to women aged 30+ and men aged 35+, the competition provides a fantastic opportunity for players to continue their hockey journey alongside like-minded individuals.

In the Men's Division 1 Competition, Carlton Redcliffs showcased their quality, claiming the title with a 12-0 victory over the SUHC Stags in a match featuring several former New Zealand representatives. The Women's grade saw old rivals Hornby Bengals and Waimak face off in the final, with Hornby demonstrating their championship pedigree in a 4-1 victory to cap off another stellar season.

A key highlight of the Masters Competition is its social aspect. Players enjoy the camaraderie and shared love of hockey, often cultivated over many years, while playing in the great summer weather. This vibrant community atmosphere is a significant reason for the Competition's continued growth.



CANTERBURY PERFORMANCE CENTRE

The Canterbury Performance Centre is underpinned by a holistic, athlete centred development model that ensures players are well-prepared to perform at the highest levels of regional and national competition. The Centre continues to be a cornerstone of this system, providing a structured, high-quality training environment for athletes involved in Canterbury's top Secondary School, Division One, and Premier League hockey competitions.

Throughout 2024, the Centre maintained alignment with both the Canterbury representative pathway and Hockey New Zealand's national development framework, ensuring that athletes received consistent and progressive training that supports long-term performance goals.

Led by Canterbury Hockey Talent Development Manager Chris Leslie and supported by an experienced coaching group, including Andrew Hastie, Kate Trolove, Rory Crawford, Matt Walcott, Ben Owers, Joe Piggott, Georgia Leslie, Sunjay Ganda, and Joe Morrison. The programme also benefited from expert goalkeeping coaching by Emil Collins and Josh White. This depth and diversity in coaching expertise provided athletes with comprehensive and high-level development experiences.

The programme was delivered in two focused phases. Phase one (January–February) offered twice-weekly sessions on Monday and Wednesday, while Phase two (November–December) provided weekly Wednesday sessions. Across both phases, 100 athletes engaged in the programme, reflecting strong ongoing participation and demand.

Performance outcomes were driven by a targeted training model that combined skill refinement with tactical and conceptual development. Sessions focused on decision making under pressure, technical execution, and game understanding, particularly under conditions of fatigue. The Centre believes these are key elements in building resilient, game ready athletes.

The Canterbury Performance Centre remains dedicated to delivering high performance development opportunities into the future.

REPRESENTATIVE

Canterbury's representative teams celebrated a massively successful year across their respective national tournaments. Of the eight teams that competed, five secured podium finishes, highlighted by championship victories from the Cavaliers, Beavers, and Barracudas. The U18A men finished with a silver medal, and the Cats secured a bronze medal.

Otago hosted the Mainland Cup in Dunedin over King's Birthday weekend. The competition plays an important part in the preparation of our U18 teams heading to their national events. Canterbury also entered both men's and women's U23 teams. It's great that this age group can play some competitive competition leading into senior trials. Canterbury proudly retained the Mainland Cup for the fifth consecutive year.

Canterbury hosted the inaugural Educare Matariki Invitational Tournament. This tournament was for players predominately in the U21 age group. The men's teams that attended were Canterbury A, Canterbury B, Northern Heat, Wellington, Otago, and South Canterbury. The women were represented by Canterbury A, Canterbury B, Wellington, and Otago. The Canterbury A men secured the Gold medal with the B team finishing fifth. The Canterbury A women secured the silver and the B team the bronze.

Canterbury again hosted the annual Ōtautahi Cup. The event provides ideal preparation for the National Hockey Championships. The tournament featured Canterbury's senior squads – Cavaliers, Cats, Beavers, and Barracudas, alongside representative teams from Wellington and Otago. As usual, there was some fierce competition and close matches. Canterbury successfully defended the Cup title.

It was fantastic to see Canterbury hosting the Vantage National U18 Women's Championships. Canterbury's A, B, and Development teams showcased their talent. While they didn't compete in the medal rounds there was some great hockey played. The B team finished in 5th place, the A's in 6th place, and the Development team finished in 20th spot.

The Vantage National U18 Men's Championships were held in Hawkes Bay with our A and B teams competing. The A team won their semi-final convincingly demolishing Hawkes Bay 7-1. The final was fiercely contested against Auckland A, with the Aucklanders winning 3-1. The B team was competitive in all matches, however, lost their quarter-final to Hawke's Bay in a shoot-out. They went on to finish in 8th place.

It was an amazing Ford National Hockey Championships in Palmerston North. The Canterbury Cats played in Tier One and progressed to the playoffs. They had to beat Auckland to progress to the final. Unfortunately, they suffered a 1-0 loss. With a strong performance against Manawatu winning 2-0, the Cats secured the bronze medal.

The Barracudas played in Tier Two had an awesome week winning all three pool matches, then a semifinal





win over old rivals North Harbour B, and defeating Counties Manukau 1-0 in a tight final to finish with the Gold medal.

The Beavers men played in Tier Two and continued their success at this level. The team had an early scare, drawing with Wairarapa on day 1, however they proceeded to demolish all their other pool opponents. With a convincing win over South Canterbury in the quarterfinals they progressed to defeat Tauranga 2-0 in the semi-final. The final was a very exciting affair with Hawke's Bay, ending in a shoot-out. The Beavers came away with the victory and secured the gold medal for the fourth time in a row.

The Cavaliers men started the Tier One tournament in fine fashion scoring sixteen goals in two matches and conceding one. The pool cross-over with North Harbour saw the match go to shootouts with the Cavaliers victorious. Their next match saw a 3-2 win against Otago as well as the 100th cap for Cavalier Goalkeep George Enersen. They suffered a hiccup against Waikato losing a shoot-out but had secured enough points to progress to the final against North Harbour. Which was another fantastic closely fought final, where the Cavaliers secured their first gold in 11 years.

CANTERBURY ARTIFICIAL SURFACES TRUST REPORT

The year ended 30 September 2024 was a very quiet one for the Trust, compared to the previous year when major upgrades were made to the Nunweek Park facilities.

Facilities

With new surfaces on Nunweek 1 and 2 and both turfs reportedly performing very well, Canterbury Artificial Surfaces Trust's (CAST) attention turned to Nunweek 3, as the Trust has received some adverse comments about this surface. Despite the fact that it is 11 years old, it has had substantially less play than the other turfs. However this turf becomes slippery when wet, for example on dewy evenings, resulting in players slipping over. Canterbury Hockey have also restricted the use of this turf due to this problem. CAST has had some more coarse sand applied to a quarter of the turf and Canterbury Hockey is conducting a survey of players using this turf to see if improved traction is noticed on this section of the turf. Following analysis of this data, CAST will consult with Canterbury Hockey and make a decision on further action. The other area of concern is the design and state of the car-park and Canterbury Hockey is working with the Christchurch City Council to get some improvements there.

Financial Performance

CAST is very aware of the costs of playing hockey and has maintained the leasing costs of the Nunweek turfs to CHA, at \$70,000 per turf per year. The major cost incurred is the cost of insurance of the facilities and we review this annually through an Insurance Broker, to ensure that we have the best deal available. CAST is continuing to repay the CHA loan for the upgraded lights on Nunweek 1. The Trust had an almost break even operational year, while repaying capital plus interest on the CHA loan, but a substantial loss of nearly \$200,000 after depreciation.

Conclusion

The structural model that our sport has, with CAST as an asset owning arm independent of Canterbury Hockey, is being looked at by other sports in similar situations, as a good way to operate. I am grateful for the continued contributions of our Trustees; Peter Cox, Kurt Gurden, Nick Harris, Ian Riach, Diana Te Awa. In addition, the success of this model depends on having good communications between CAST and Canterbury Hockey. In this regard I wish to acknowledge the excellent relationship that we have with CEO Shane Maddaford.

CAST continues to be mindful of its wider objective of ensuring Canterbury has the facilities required to grow the game throughout the region and is always ready to connect with initiatives for new developments.
