

Chairman's Report

The past twelve months saw Canterbury Hockey move in a very positive direction. This was reflected in both on field and off field achievements.

The on field success was exemplified by the return of well delivered local competitions, our quality representative teams achieving well on the national stage, and individuals achieving high honours either as players or umpires.

Off field progress has been the most significant for a number of years.

Our staffing and job role restructure was met with wide approval from the community, resulting in our members being very satisfied with the service and support they receive. The happy and cohesive staff dynamic provides a great platform to deliver hockey.

In terms of growing the game, we have a strategic direction to make hockey in Canterbury accessible and welcoming to any person who wishes to be involved. We are involved with Tū Manawa Active Aotearoa, the Sport and Recreation Integrity Transition Programme to work with whānau Maori, engaging with and providing hockey opportunities to individuals with physical disabili-

ties, and plan to reach out to other cultures who may be interested in playing hockey. We also aim to provide opportunities for tamariki and rangatahi who may not otherwise be able to participate due to circumstances. Canterbury Hockey continues to embrace the Sport New Zealand initiative of Balance is Better philosophy which supports quality sport experiences for all young people, regardless of ability, needs and motivations. It is about young people staying involved in sport for life and realising their potential at the right time. The main focus is on youth, given the decline we are seeing in teenage participation.

A major off field project has been the upgrade of Nunweek Park. Turfs 1 and 2 have been re surfaced with top quality wet turf material, along with upgraded water and lighting infrastructure. Nunweek Park is again a high quality hockey facility.

Hockey New Zealand has moved back to a decentralisation model for elite athletes. Although the operational details are still being finalised, Canterbury will have an important role to play as the hub for the northern part of the South Island. We will be working with Mid and South Canterbury, the West Coast, Marlborough and Nelson to develop athletes

in those areas.

The financial position remains stable. Our funders and sponsors remain a vital part of the financial model and we thank them for their continued support for Canterbury Hockey. We recorded a \$20,528 surplus for the year and we continue to have a comparatively strong equity position. I would like to thank the work done by our staff finance manager Heidi O'Brien and Board Finance leader Martin Perry who have both worked diligently in managing financial matters. Thanks also to our auditor Mark Tynan from Ashton Wheelans.

Shane Maddaford has now been part of Canterbury Hockey for 17 months and already his leadership and acumen has been appreciated by most both within the hockey community, and stakeholders outside hockey.

We thank the CHA staff for great work in 2022. We appreciate the strong team dynamic, cohesive behaviour, and desire to do their best for hockey, which signifies a high level of pride in what they do for our community.

I would like to acknowledge the massive contribution of our volunteers.





These people work across all facets of hockey and at all levels. Their work underpins what our sport is. Without these people, we wouldn't be able to operate to the level we strive for.

Hockey is very grateful to have had the support from Christchurch City Council, Selwyn District Council, Waimakariri District Council. Not only by providing key playing facilities, the wider support for the delivery and promotion of hockey is appreciated.

The CHA Board will present its 2023 – 2028 Strategic Plan at its AGM in May 2023. The plan has been developed with focus on what we need to do in Canterbury, but will be aligned with the direction of Hockey NZ and the wider sports environment in New Zealand.

Thanks to our Umpires, Competitions, Masters, and Junior Committees. We acknowledge the sound direction they provide, and the assistance they gave to the office and Board. We wish to thank the Judicial Committee led by Rachel Morrison for their demanding but important work.

The management of CHA values very highly the relationship with the North West Community Trust and St Bede's College, the North Canterbury Sports Trust and Waikirikiri Hockey at Rolleston. Equally the Board of CHA appreciates the relationship with WASP, the Harewood Hockey Club, and the use and management of the Nunweek Park complex. The Board appreciates the ongoing support from its relationship with the Canterbury Artificial Surfaces Trust (CAST).

The annual Awards night attracted a large number of attendees, celebrating what was ultimately a very good season around community hockey. The respective hockey awards can be found in the body of this report. Congratulations to all those who were honoured.

I would like to thank my fellow Board members Simon Munt (Deputy Chair), Rachel Morrison, Penny Gough, Martin Perry and Jules Harris. Murray Chesterman stepped down from the Board at the 2021 AGM. Murray served 4 years as a Board member and was a vital part of the finance team, along with providing sound judgement and wisdom over

a range of Board matters. As a valuable Board member we thank Murray for his fine contribution to CHA. At the 2021 AGM we welcomed Jules Harris to the Board. Jules has vast experience in risk management and governance and we look forward to working with her.

Our President and Awards Committee chair, Jeanette Harper, has made the move to Blenheim and has stepped down as our President. Jeanette's contribution to CHA will be acknowledged at the 2022 AGM in May. We would however like to acknowledge and thank her for the long and dedicated loyal service and great work she has done across many facets of Canterbury Hockey.

We are delighted to report a very good 2022 for Canterbury Hockey. 2023 promises to be exciting as we aspire to build on the foundations set in 2022.

Chief Executive's Report



Despite another interesting and somewhat challenging year, I am extremely pleased to report that 2022 was still a greatly successful year for our organisation and the community.

Our highlights include - successfully delivering an uninterrupted 2022 Club and School competitions, introduction of the inaugural CPL Heritage round, sending our four U18 representative teams and ten officials away to the Nelson and Palmerston North tournaments (well done to our champion U18A girls team), our four senior representative teams and eight officials attending the first NHC tournament of the revised format (well done to our champion Cats team), delivery of another successful U13 and U15 development programme and festivals, a total of 45 Junior and Community Umpiring badges achieved, successfully hosting the CHA Golf Day, and finally... completing a full year with our new CHA staff structure and hockey delivery to our community.

Financial Results

Following another challenging financial year in 2021, our organisation was optimistic of a more stable environment in 2022 that would hopefully see a full calendar of competitions, programmes and events to help achieve an improved financial result, and one that was not reliant on subsidies or relief funding that have played such a contributing factors over the recent pandemic period.

Pleasingly, we were able to deliver the uninterrupted calendar that we set up to offer our community, and with that came not only a positive result for our key hockey specific and delivery metrics, but a positive overall result too.

Across our key hockey specific and delivery metrics of affiliation, training & match fee's and Competition, participation & development revenue, we were able to deliver a result over \$30k higher than 2021.

The other big three influential factors to our financial result were again Grant funding, our Representative Programme and Sponsorship.

Given the challenging and uncertain nature of the Grant Funding environment, a greater level of focus and planning was proposed for 2022. This approached was instrumental in delivering a very strong funding result and saw the level of funding approved almost return to pre-Covid levels (97% of 2019 funding). This level of success was again largely due to the strong funding relationship with our largest partners in New Zealand Community Trust - their generous support for our organisation is truly remarkable. We are also extremely appreciative and grateful for the continued funding and support we receive from our other amazing funding partners - Rātā Foundation, Mainland Foundation, Lion Foundation, Pub Charity, The Trust Community Foundation, Air Rescue Services, One Foundation and the returning support from The TAB and Aotearoa Gaming Trust your generous funding and support in these challenging times means so much to our sport and community.

With the new level of reduced restrictions in place for the country, both the National U18 tournaments and the new National Hockey Championship format were able to take place for the first time under the new Na-

tional Representative calendar. Given Canterbury Hockey are the only Association left in New Zealand that provided a subsidised equalisation for all of our players participating in these programmes and campaigns, the full execution of this programme comes with an increased financial impact to the Association. The level of support to subsidise our representative teams remains to be a significantly influencing factor for our full year result, however, we are constantly endeavouring to reduce the overall costs to our players and organisation to the best of our ability.

With a refresh perspective on how our overall sponsorship model and offer should look, with the introduction of increased benefits to our partnerships, I'm pleased to advise the financial result achieved for Sponsorship revenue in 2022 is the highest on record that Canterbury Hockey Association has ever generated. With this revised model still holding so much potential to improve, we are optimistic that this revenue pool will continue to grow thanks to our amazing community of supporters and partners. In 2022, we welcomed a number of new and exciting partners to our whānau, with Signbiz, The Trade in Post and Waste Management all coming on board.

I would also like to not only thank our amazing sponsorship partners, but to also encourage our community to support these generous businesses who have chosen to investment their time and funds into our organisation and our community to help our sport continue to grow and be successful.

Please join me in thanking – Ashton Wheelans, Ford Baker, Happy Hire, Harris Farms, CMG Sport, Crown Plaza, Paladin, Aqua Heat and New World Bishopdale and even more praise to our major sponsors – Motus Health, Just Hockey, Polytan, Connetics and Mike Greer Homes – your

continued support for our community is greatly appreciated!

As an organisation, the recent environments we have been forced to operate within have taught us to constantly monitor, review and propose to best way to financial manage our Association. With a higher level of confident in our current model, and our improved planning and innovative approach to our key areas of Grant Funding and Sponsorship, it is pleasing to have delivered a positive 2022 result of a \$20,528 profit.

Delivering Hockey for our Community

Although 2022 was still in many ways a challenging year to deliver community sport, it was extremely enjoyable for the team and I to have successfully delivered a vertically interrupted season of competitions, programmes and events to our entire community.

Bookended by our ever growing Summer and Masters competitions, the winter season was played out in its entirety for the first time a many years, with all winter competitions, youth development programmes and our representative campaigns all delivered in-line with the full year plan. The execution of all of these deliverables was further accentuated by the fact that all of our participants numbers achieved a good level of growth, across team numbers competing in our competitions, our participant numbers for our Development and Performance programmes, and our trial numbers for our Representative campaigns. In a difficult environment where many sports are experiencing declining numbers, hockey and particularly in Canterbury, are trending in a much more positive direction, providing a great level of enthusiasm for the CHA team and community for the future.

Our Association and region once again enjoyed playing host to a number of key events throughout the year. Following the CHA Finals weekend, in August Ngā Puna Wai hosted the second instalment of the Ōtautahi Cup, the newly created mini-tournament designed to prepare our four Canterbury teams, along with Otago and Wellington for the National Hockey Championship. This event saw our Canterbury Cats and Cavaliers defend their title in front of a home crowd. The day after this event saw the return of the National Secondary School tournament schedule, with the Johnson Cup & Audrey Timlin Memorial tournaments returning to the South Island for a wonderful week of hockey.

The final hosting events on the calendar for the Canterbury region, was the return and execution of our U13 and U15 development programmes. This once again saw the Balance is Better philosophy incorporated into the structure and direction of the South Island U13 Festival and U15 Tournament. Like the first version of these events in 2021, these were once again two hugely successful events, featuring a development focused environment where 64 teams across 10 Associations and 44 umpires enjoyed a tournament like atmosphere where all participants were given the opportunity to compete and represent their regions. These massive events would not be possible without our dedicated CHA staff who led the implementation on the ground over 8 huge days of hockey - by behalf of the entire South Island region of Associations, thank vou so much team!

Connecting our Hockey Community

Creating an authentic connection between myself, my team and our community is a clear goal and vision I have had right from day one in my role. I believe this is the key factor to achieving genuine success and a sustainable future for our sport, and an important factor in the relationship between our community of Clubs and Schools. After now completing a full calendar year in the role with a full-strength team, I'm happy to ad-

vise that, in my opinion, the community connection is currently in a very good place and is trending is a great direction, largely thanks to the CHA team we have serving our community. The level of passion and dedication the team and I share for our sport, our community and the overall success of our game is extremely pleasing to see in action every day. The future looks bright for our community.

One of the key elements to successfully connecting with our community is through the important relationship CHA has with our Clubs. In 2022, with our new team on board, we have set out to both review and revitalise how this relationship should look. With our dedicated team now providing resources and expertise in many areas of our sport delivery, our focus is now firmly on how we can work alongside our Clubs and School to correctly support and assist in the best way possible to ensure we continue to grow our wonderful sport together.

The 2022 CHA Golf Day was a great example of re-connecting with our community. After doubling the size of the event, selling it out in less than 48 hours, the day was again a great success, with Russley Golf Club playing host to a wonderful day of golf, sponsorship activation and community engagement. Thank you to all our generous supporters of this event, especially the Reefton Distilling Co., Just Hockey, Harris Farms, Rack & Roof, Dominator Doors, Media Works, Boyd Chamberlain Architecture, Amicus and Nexia - we can't wait to host you all again next year.

CHA is very proud of the improvements we have been making with the connection with our community, and will continued to find ways, avenues, events, and conversation to ensure this momentum continues into 2023 and beyond.

Strengthening our Business

Like most businesses and success-

ful organisations, there are two key contributing factors – the product and the people. Luckily, hockey is one of the most exciting and amazing sporting products around.

Even more fortunate, CHA now has arguably the largest, most experienced, and definitely the most dedicated team in New Zealand. Following the completion of our staff restructuring exercise, 2022 saw a new team of nine CHA staff start the year complete with new roles, some new faces, some old faces, a new structure and a huge motivation to serve our community and grow our wonderful product of hockey.

Joining the team we welcomed Heidi O'Brien to our Finance Manager role, Joe Piggott to our newly created Community Participation Manager role, Chris Leslie to our revised Talent Development Manager role, Campbell Ross started the year in our newly created Officials Development Officer role, before taking up an exciting opportunity, and being replacing by Ethan Booth, and Sunjay Ganda to our Hockey Development Manager role.

The standard of candidates we have manage to recruit into these pivotal roles is truly incredible, and the level of passion, innovation, and energy they have added to our team been extremely appreciated by myself, Sam, Steve and Lucy – thanks heaps team!

2022 did see the departure of one of Canterbury Hockey's greatest servants. After seven years, and a pandemic delay, Ben Owers finally got the opportunity to experience life and hockey in Europe and took it with open arms. On behalf of the staff, the Board, and I'm sure, the entire community, we truly wish Ben all the best for his overseas experience and look forward to him returning one day to share his new found knowledge and stories with our community.

Our sport and region is blessed with

a truly remarkable quality of volunteers. Without them our community just wouldn't be the same. From our Club and School administrators, coaches, managers, officials and volunteers and the endless commitment they show towards our teams is truly appreciated. Added that, thank you so much to our tremendously valuable advisory committees that help provide feedback and direction to all aspects of our game, and to the leaders within these groups, your efforts are highly respected by myself, the staff and the CHA Board. Community Hockey Development

Our Small Sticks in-schools programme was continued in 2022, with a focus on delivering to schools in areas with high potential for participation growth. A total of eight schools' addition to the traditional in-school delivery, we also supported the delivery of North Canterbury Sports Trust 'have a go days', Selwyn Sport Trust winter sports programme, The Elmwood Club's winter sports programme, and MASH school holiday programmes, which provided an additional 2380 children with exposure to hockey.

On top of Canterbury Hockey's efforts to expose more young people to hockey and grow the sport, our clubs supported us with the delivery of their own programmes. Once again, Fun Sticks programmes were delivered by nine clubs to a total of 223 years 1 and 2 school-aged children. While both Hurunui and Waikirikiri delivered social and skill development programmes to new players of all ages.

Outside of traditional hockey programmes, Canterbury Hockey also formed a partnership with Canterbury Cricket, Touch Canterbury, Squash Canterbury and the North-

west Collective of Community Trusts, Networks and Organizations to deliver the Kia Kori Waitaha initiative. This initiative aimed to get more of our young people active and targeted those that typically miss out on these opportunities. Led by Canterbury Cricket Participation Activators, this programme was delivered in schools, holiday programmes, community groups, and events and created over 20,000 participations. For under 13 players, this involved a training camp in the July school holidays for all Year 7 & 8 players. At the end of September Year 7 & 8s participated in Regional Festival with Mid Canterbury & South Canterbury. On 24th September for girls and 25th September the Year 7s travelled to Ashburton for a one day 7 a-side Regional Festival. While the Year 8s played an 11 a-side 3-day Regional Festival in Christchurch September 23rd – 25th. During these festivals over 350 children participated over the two-year groups.

Under 15 players also took part in a training camp during the July school holidays and then also had an opportunity to participate in a South Island under 15 Tournament. The Tournament took place from Octo-

ber 2nd to 6th and involved 32 from associations all around the South Island. Canterbury was fortunate to have 7 girls' teams & 4 boys per gender and a total of players 168 involved.

A variety of coach development opportunities were delivered during 2022 with 225 coaches participating with 12 different courses delivered in Christchurch. As part of the South Island Collective, we also delivered coaching course in Nelson, Blenheim, Ashburton & Timaru for the respective hockey associations. We also held our first ever Introduction to Developer course with 10 people participating and learning the concept of developer and how it will look within a club or community setting. While we also delivered coaches course while mentoring was provided by trained Developers to over 20 coaches during both the under 13 and 15 development events.

A special mention and thank you needs to be extended to our Advisory Committees, the Youth Development Working Group, and everyone else who volunteered their time as a coach, umpire, administrator, or supporter of hockey in Canterbury.



Offer Meaningful Competitions

2022 was back to business as usual traditional Kiwi team sports. following the years of COVID effected competitions which was of great relief to clubs, schools, and administrators alike. Providing meaningful competition opportunities to our community is a hugely important part of our association which great resource goes into to make it as successful as possible. Credit must go to our hard-working club and school administrators who week in week out provide their participants with access to coaching, equipment, uniforms, team administration and support.

414 teams in 2021 grew to 417 teams in 2022 which was a pleasant bounce back post COVID which is a positive trend compared to what some other sports experienced. Once again, our senior growth came in the women's competitions going from 23 teams to 25 teams which can be attributed to the drive to create more quality experiences for female participants. Another growth area came from moving our Year 3-4 mini sticks boys to be played on Friday nights. After several years of stagnant or declining numbers we saw an increase of 3 teams into this competition which is a step in the right direction of providing young males an alternative winter sporting experience compared to

Senior Hockey

In the Canterbury Premier League (CPL) we saw the Carlton Redcliffs women take out the regular season Hinemoa Cup for 2022 with an extremely impressive record of 11 wins and 1 loss. In the playoffs a new 3 match finals series was piloted with the top two teams being rewarded for their round robin standings and it being more challenging for places three and four having to win three games to win the finals trophy. This new finals series saw Harewood women come from third place to win their qualifying final on the Saturday, Preliminary final on the Wednesday then the grand final the following Saturday to take out the finals trophy.

The men's competition was again hotly contested with the season coming down to the final few weeks to sort out the top four teams. For the first time in Marist club history the men took out the highly prestigious presidents shield gaining 10 wins, 1 draw and 3 losses. The new 3 match finals series again added excitement to the men's competition with four highly entertaining playoff matches leaving old foes Carlton Redcliffs

and Marist in the grand final. Marist were successful in the final adding the finals trophy to their collection for the off season.

Secondary School Hockey

Secondary School hockey in Canterbury is an energetic, passion filled spectacle being played out across our turf network on Wednesday and Friday nights. This high calibre competition has a proud tradition across the country of having one of the deepest talent pools aiding to the success of Canterbury Hockey. Connetics was again the valued sponsor of our premier boys and girls competitions on Friday nights at Ngā Puna Wai drawing sizeable crowds through the cold weather and late nights to what the athletes represent their school with pride. In the girls competition Christchurch Girls High School strongly finished the regular season unbeaten scoring 20 goals across 5 championship games and came up against St Margaret's College in the Final. In-front of a noisy crowd the athletes put it all on the line with St Margaret's edging out Girls high 3-2 to lift the trophy. Christchurch Girls High got their own back when they were able to travel to Federation cup and picked up the national title two weeks later.





The boys premier competition grew to eight teams in 2022 from the 6 the year before showing the competitive growth of school boys hockey in Canterbury. Timaru Boys High School continued their impressive form from across recent years by leading after the round robin with 7 wins, 0 losses and a goal differential of +33. Timaru came up against regular playoff contenders St Andrews College in the final late into the even on finals night delighting the boisterous crowd with skill and speed in an entertaining final won by St Andrews College.

Platinum Hockey

Platinum hockey, since being developed into a compulsory grade for year 9 and 10 club players, has again seen growth in numbers. Quality coaches and the continued development of our Under 15 programs saw these players experience a positive season with a conscious balance between competition and development.

Club emphasis on supporting this grade as a successful pathway for their players has seen positive experiences and club collaboration befitting of this age group.

Junior Hockey

Phase two of implementing 7 a side hockey was executed in the 2022 junior season by having both year 7s and year 8s playing 7-a-side hockey. This Hockey New Zealand initiative has been strongly supported by Canterbury hockey as a successful approach to year 7 and 8 participants to help give age-appropriate competitions. Phase two saw a transition period in the final third of the season for year 8s to experience and develop as 11-a-side hockey players after growing their hockey skills in 7-a-side earlier in the season. 186 teams competed in Canterbury Hockey junior competitions on a Saturday morning across 14 venues ranging from year 3s right up to year

Masters Hockey

Canterbury Hockey has a strong tradition of a well-supported masters community led by their passionate committee. 2022 saw more teams than ever in the locally run competition with seventeen men's teams and fourteen women's teams spanning teams from as far south as Ashburton right through to Rangiora and individual participants coming from further still! This competition gives players of both a beginner and experienced level the opportunity to play with their peers in regular fixtures on

a Thursday night over the Summer months. This includes players new to the game, returning to the game, or who love the game a chance to play hockey all year round if they desire and meet the age requirements of the men's and women's grades.

Summer Hockey

With our summer social hockey now played regularly across both Nunweek park and Ngā Puna Wai we have seen great engagement from the community to play the game over summer in a social setting. Numbers continue to increase in this space strongly supported by local schools and teams who regularly enter the competitions. In 2022 over 150 teams participated in our social summer hockey offerings equating to over 1200 people.

Administration

A big thank you needs to go out to the relevant advisory committees for assisting in the smooth running of our competitions. These committees are our competitions, Junior, Masters and umpire committees. The time and effort these committees and their members put in to making the game as successful as possible needs to be celebrated and appreciated.



Canterbury Performance Centre

The Canterbury Hockey Development Network piloted at the end of 2020 was re-branded this year and is now identified as the Canterbury Performance Centre. The Centre aligns with Canterbury representative and Hockey NZ pathways. Chris Leslie, Canterbury's Talent Development Manager coordinated the delivery of the programme with assistant from Hockey NZ Performance coach, Aaron Ford.

Invitations to register for the programme were extended to Canterbury Premier League, Division One and Secondary School Premier players over the age of 16 as of 1st January 2022. The programme incredibly popular with close to 90 players registering.

The programme had two levels of entry. The Senior level included Black Sticks, Junior Black Sticks and Canterbury Premier League players. The Emerging Talent level included Division One and Secondary School Premier players.

The delivery of the programme was divided into two blocks. The first block ran for five weeks during November and December 2022 and the second block will run for six weeks during January and February 2023. Both blocks offer two training sessions per week.

The Centre provided quality development opportunities delivered by several of Canterbury's representative coaches and contracted strength and conditioning providers.

The primary aim of the Centre is to help develop and prepare players for higher honours that are proficient in technical skills, tactical awareness, are mentally prepared and physical capable.

The on-pitch sessions delivered included.

- Exercises to develop and enhance core skills
- Conceptional training that encourage players to implement skills in offensive and defensive scenarios.
- Games where players are given the opportunity to execute skills in match situations and make good decisions under pressure and fatigue.
- Specialist goal keeping training.
- Specific conditioning component (Mondays)

Representative

It was fantastic to see all our representative teams competing in their respect national tournaments without COVID disruptions and what a successful year it was.

The representative build-up included the Mainland Cup hosted by Otago Hockey over Queens Birthday weekend. Our Under 18A and B men, Under 18B women and the Under 23 men and women c0ompeted in the event and with combined results retained the Cup. Our Under 18A women travelled to Auckland and played the Auckland and North Harbour Under 18 women's teams.

Canterbury Hockey hosted the Ōtautahi Cup. This is an annual event hosted by Canterbury in Christchurch between Canterbury, Otago, and Wellington. Canterbury enter our four senior teams (Cats, Cavaliers, Beavers and Barracudas). Canterbury were the eventual winners for the second year in a row.

The Canterbury Under 18A and B women competed in the Vantage National Under 18 Women's Championship held in Nelson. The A

team dominated the championship winning all their pool matches, the semi-final against our B team and defeated Hawkes Bay in the final 3-1 to take out the Amanda Hooper Memorial Trophy. The team scored 32 gaol and conceded 1.

The B team performed exceptionally well finishing top of their pool. They were defeated by Canterbury A in the semi-final. They finished the championship in 4th place losing to a strong Wellington side in the 3rd vs 4th playoff.

The Vantage National Under 18 Men's Championship was held in Palmerston North. Canterbury was represented by our A and B teams and competed for the Paul Ackerley Memorial Trophy. The A team had a fantastic tournament. They were undefeated in pool play and did not concede a goal. After disposing of Waikato in the semi-final, they advanced to the final and played a strong North Harbour side in a repeat of the 2021 final. North Harbour started strongly going into the half time break with a 4-0 lead. Canterbury's response was superb with a

great 3rd and 4th quarter flighting back to score 3 goals. North Harbour hung on to their lead to claim the title. The B team had mixed results and were defeated in their first 3 matches. It was great to see a win in their final pool match and win their cross over. North Harbour B proved too strong in the final match. The team finished in 14th place.

Due to COVID -19 the previous two Ford National Senior Championships were cancelled so it was great to finally see teams compete for titles in Dunedin.

The Canterbury Cats had a very successful week securing the K Cup in Tier One of the tournament. The team started the week strongly winning the first three matches. After a slip up in game four being beaten by Auckland it was a nervous wait on another match result to see if they would progress to the final. Fortunately, it played out in the Cats favour and they met North Harbour in an exciting final. North Harbour scored in the 1st quarter however the Cats levelled the score a minute later. A 2nd quarter goal from





Canterbury proved to be the winner and ensured they secured the gold.

The Canterbury Cavaliers were competing for the Challenge Shield in Tier One. They played some exciting hockey drawing 4-4 in their opening match with eventual tournament winners Otago. Unfortunately, they couldn't secure the shoot-out win. They defeated their next two opponents in pool play. However, the cross over matches proved tough with the team unable to secure a win. They finished the tournament on a high defeating Auckland on the final day to with the bronze medal.

The Canterbury Beavers men competed in Tier 2 of the men's tournament. They comfortably won their pool securing four wins, scoring 20 goals, and conceding 1. Their semi-final was a very entertaining match with opponents Northland matching the Beavers step for step. The match finished 3-3 in regulation time. The Beavers won the insuring sudden death shoot out to book a spot in the final against North Harbour B. This match was another tense affair with the Beavers taking an early lead. Harbour pegged a goal back before half time. The Beavers secured a 2-1 win with a goal early in the 3rd quar-

ter winning the Newman's Trophy.

Our Canterbury Barracudas Women competed in Tier 2 of the women's tournament. The young team had mixed results winning one of their three pool matches. It was great to see them win both their cross overs including an 8-1 win in the final match to finish in 7th place.

Winning 3 golds, a silver, and a bronze medal on the national stage was a fantastic accomplishment and a testament to the hard work and dedication of the teams and their management.

Officials Report

2022 saw Canterbury Hockey Umpires and Technical Officials complete a fantastic year, which help ensure high quality hockey experience was delivered in 2022.

Canterbury Hockey had 2 National Tournaments, Johnson Cup, and Audrey Timlin. We also had South Island U15 Festival, U13 Canterbury Regional Festival, and Ōtautahi Cup. All five tournaments/Festivals gave our locals, and regional officials and opportunity to step into management roles, such as Tournament Director, Umpire Manager, and Technical Officer. At the Men's National U18, we had Canterbury Umpires, Match Directors, and 3rd umpires all appointed to Gold and Bronze Medal Matches. At the National Hockey Championships, we had Ben Grant appointed to officiating the men's Gold Medal Match, with Nick Saunders Reserving. We also, had Gareth Greenfield Umpiring the Bronze Medal Match. Ben Grant also received Male Umpire of the tournament. On the Women's side, we had Nic Rankin been Appointed as Technical Director for the Gold Medal Women's Match, and Katrina Turner umpired the Bronze medal final.

In 2022 Canterbury Hockey ran two theory sessions for Junior, and Community Badge. We had over 70 Junior Umpires, from clubs and CHA officials attend this course, and 28 Community Badge Umpires. We had 3 Umpire pass their Level 1 Umpiring, 19 Community Badge, and 26 Junior Badge. All umpires received there New Zealand Hockey badge, Certificate, and a letter. This was slightly down from 2021. A massive thank you to all the umpires and officials, both in Senior and Junior that turned up every week, and accepted development opportunities throughout 2022. The association cannot run without your time and dedication.

Canterbury Artificial Surfaces Trust Report

The year to 30 September 2022 was taken up with planning for the major replacement and renewal project at Nunweek Park. Since the end of our financial year, the project has progressed smoothly and is on schedule for completion by the end of March 2023.

Leading into the project last year CAST had accumulated around \$1.3M, but as the total project was projected to cost around \$2.7M, we clearly had some fundraising to do. Trustee, Kurt Gurden led this task, the result of which was that CAST raised sufficient funds to enable us to give the approval to the main contractor, Polytan, to go ahead with the full project. This involved the replacement of the turf on Nunweek 2 with a water based turf and the complete revamp of Nunweek 1 (base as well as turf) with another water based turf. CAST, CHA and the wider Canterbury Hockey Community owes Kurt a huge thank you for his diligence, leading to the fund raising success that he has achieved for CAST.

During the year some issues were raised about the slippery nature of the Nunweek 3 surface under certain conditions and some remedial action was taken to address this. The Nunweek 3 surface has not been used as much as the Nunweek 2 surface and it look as if it will not need replacement for another few years. With the requirement of the World to move towards waterless surfaces (the 2028 Olympics will be on water-

less turfs) it is probable that when Nunweek 3 is ready for replacement, it will be a waterless surface.

When the project is finished at Nunweek, including new lights on Nunweek 1, Canterbury Hockey will have another great hub for the sport.

Financial Performance

CAST's charge to Canterbury Hockey for the use of the Nunweek Park turfs in the 2022 season was maintained at the same level (\$70,000 per turf). The Trustees are mindful of the cost to play hockey and have maintained this same charge for many years now.

The audit of the accounts came at an interesting time with respect to the project described above, as some funds had been received for the project and little spent. However, in business as usual, a small surplus of \$1000 was achieved after taking account of depreciation. Clearly our financial situation will be very different in the next financial year with term deposit interest income greatly reduced. Re assessment of our insurances with the new turfs will also probably increase insurance premiums.

Conclusion

This year has been one of the busiest since the earthquakes of 2010/2011. The Trustees have met many times both face to face and on line and communicated regularly by email to pass the resolutions required to progress the Nunweek project. CAST advertised for a new Trustee and were very pleased with the interest from the community and delighted to appoint Kurt Gurden to the Trust. His value to CAST has been referred to above. The other Trustees are; Peter Cox, Nick Harris, Selwyn Maister, Ian Riach and Diana Te Awa. I am extremely grateful for the support of all the Trustees to the work of CAST during this demanding year.

The success of CAST as a Trust supporting Canterbury Hockey for more than 20 years now, has been built on good communications with CHA and this has been continued during the year, with Shane Maddaford (executive) and Mark Beatson (governance) leading their teams. CAST wishes to thank both Shane and Mark for their excellent levels of communication and support during the year. From my discussions around the Canterbury sports, I know that the structure that hockey has for the provision of facilities, with an arm's length Trust responsible for this, is the envy of many.

Finally, I'd like to express my appreciation for the level of cooperation CAST has had with Cody Linton, General Manager of Polytan, in the planning for the Nunweek project.
